WHAT IS LEARNING POVERTY?

Learning poverty refers to the inability of children to read and understand a simple text by the age of 10. It highlights the lack of basic literacy skills despite attending school and underscores the need for quality education to ensure meaningful learning outcomes.

It signifies a critical gap between schooling and actual learning outcomes. Addressing learning poverty requires interventions that focus on improving teaching quality, curriculum relevance, learning materials, and other factors that contribute to effective learning.

CURRENT SITUATION OVERVIEW

- 260 million children are not in school, which is exacerbating the learning crisis.
- Over 70% of children in low and middle-income countries struggle to read
- in Pakistan 77% of children by age 10 cannot read and understand a simple text.
- By age 12, just over half of Pakistani children can read a basic paragraph. By 16, nearly 80% can.
- Pakistan's learning poverty is significantly higher than the South Asia region and lower-middle-income countries

CHANGE THE CHANGE AS A POLICY INTERVENTION TOOL

The book serves as a solution to **learning poverty** by targeting **early childhood intervention**. Its utilization in **school curriculum** is crucial for Pakistan to meet sustainable development goal 4.

- **Conceptual Learning**
